

250th Anniversary Slide Show to be repeated 32 years later at our September meeting

November 17, 1972 was a special night in our township's 250th anniversary celebration. It was a banquet honoring those who lived in Northampton Township for 50 years or more. That evening 77 old-timers were assembled under one roof in the cafeteria of the old Council Rock High school on Newtown Road, They were treated to a chicken dinner and then a beautiful slide show in the auditorium presented by Ed Herzog. Mr. Herzog had spent many hours taking 117 slides of our oldest houses, barns (three of which have since disappeared) also bridges (some of which are not used today) and other bits of Northampton's history.

The program included Raymond Gilbert giving the invocation, and welcoming address, closing remarks by Robert Day and the slide program and script presented by Ed Herzog in the auditorium.

I was attending that night and it was just incredible to see such a gathering of old friends and neighbors that I had known since my early childhood, all in one room together. I was on the souvenir committee selling mugs, plates, maps, tiles, etc. It was an unforgettable evening. Farmers such as the Baker brothers, the Jamison brothers, Furman & Lillis Edwards, George and Edna Search, Horace and Elcie Cornell, Esther Weir, Warren Shafer, Harvey Stackhouse's, Betty Fridel Luff and sister Mary Fridel Luff, Ted, Cartie and Lida Luff,

Besides the old time farmers were Roy Davis and sister Rachel Feaster, Hannah Overholt, Harold Craven, Mrs. Harry Gill, and Hugh Douqherty, Sr. Of all the homes shown during the program, only four of the same homeowners remain today, they are the Solly, Rook, Crompton and the Gilbert families.

This unforgettable slide show will be repeated again at our Northampton Township Historical Society meeting on Wednesday evening, September 15, at the Northampton Township Library meeting room.

The Class of Thirteen - A Summer Reunion

I don't think anyone enjoys a reunion as much as I do. Whether it is a family reunion, the great big Richboro school Reunion or just my little "1942 class of fifteen" reunion.

I was invited in July to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Cameron Wilson to attend his 1939 Richboro School Reunion. Originally a class of thirteen, there were four girls and nine boys. As it often happened back then, two of the girls married classmates, they were Libby Kenderdine who married Walter Rook and Eleanor Fromuth who married Carlton Clayton.

Carlton served during World War II as a mechanic on C-47's in Washington D.C. and helped build the nuclear power plants at Peach Bottom.. After the war he became a local builder.

Walter and Libby Rook are still well known farmers, married sixty-one years. Along with their four sons, they are farming 2500 acres. Among the stories told that day, it was mentioned that Walter was born in the same bedroom in which his father had been born, and is still using that same room. What a story!

A classmate, Elinor Clarks, married Carlton's cousin, Stanley Clayton, she was employed by La Velle Aircraft.

Wallace McNabb piloted the plane in 1944 that dropped the last bomb on Tokyo. He was also a jet flight instructor for fifteen years. Then he was with a private airline "Flight Safety International" for six years. He later became a gym teacher and High School coach at Canandaiqua, New York.

Cameron Wilson graduated from Penn State and became a well known local vet, he married Edith Burrage, a music teacher with the Richboro school system. The Northampton Historical Society honored Wilson in 1995 by presenting him with the Living Tree Award. for his dedicated service to Northampton Township.

Morris Roberts was killed on a motorcycle when quite young.

Kathleen Gersch was employed at Fleet Wing, later becoming a telephone operator.

Ira Boyles enlisted before Pearl Harbor and was a chief yeoman at Pearl Harbor when it was attacked.

John Edwards joined the Army Air Force and flew B-2's in the western United .States. He became an electrician after his discharge.

Bob Rausch was killed in action in Italy.

Sam McKinney joined the Air Force and was an administrator in England, he later sold automobiles on Route One.

World War II transformed the boys into servicemen and the girls into defense plant workers, factory workers and office workers. Wages were as high as \$20 a week.

What an interesting afternoon, listening to what an important part this little class of thirteen from Richboro High School played in the future of our country.

ARCHAEOLOGICAL DIG AT THE WILLET-KNIGHT HOUSE May 15-16, 2004

The second NTHS sponsored archaeological dig was again hosted by member Clyde Cobb at his home, the Willet-Knight House in Feasterville. Since we were not successful in locating the foundation of a third building last year, Clyde generously invited us to return and resume the search.

Vivian Braubitz, professional archaeologist, and Michael Tomkins, archaeologist and historical researcher, both donated their time and expertise to repeat a marvelous learning experience for those who attended. Eleven children arrived on Saturday morning to two prepared excavation units.

Mike introduced the activity by giving the children a walking tour of the house and property. Vivian followed the tour with an archaeological orientation, covering basics such as reading soil samples and how to maintain excavation unit records.

The children were then divided between the two sites. Because the top layers of a site are called the "occupation level," the children quickly unearthed shards of pottery, glass, and small artifacts. Artifacts were bagged and labeled according to the soil layer where they were located. When the soil type changed, new bags were started for artifacts unearthed in that soil level. Vivian and Mike reminded the children to take the soil down in layers, keeping the sites level. The reason for this was so that when they hit a new soil level, a new record sheet could be started.

The children participated in all phases of the dig; some dug, some screened, some dumped dirt, some kept records, and some washed artifacts.

Digging proceeded on Sunday until late morning when the children were given permission to shovel deeply. Eventually, three of the boys began uncovering large rocks and rubble that made Vivian and Mike suspect that the foundation had been located. The boys were directed to continue digging deeply, and soon it was obvious that they had uncovered a section of wall about 2 1/2 feet below the surface. After photographs were taken, the excavation sites were back-filled quickly.

Before the children departed, each received a packet of archaeology materials and a certificate of participation in the 2004 archeological dig.

The young archaeologists were Jared Arbeter, Amanda Farese, Mike Hirthler, Steven Hannigan, Sarah Tomkins, and Bryanna McQueeney, all from Holland. From Langhorne were Dylan Lutton and Tommy Ebaugh. Also participating were Lindsay Gregory, Trevoise, Vicky Tomlinson, Warrington, and Bob Gieda from Wrightstown.

A special thank you is extended to Clyde Cobb, Vivian Braubitz, Mike Tomkins, and Debbie Glessner for making this a rewarding experience for all.

Special Note about Future NTHS Meetings

A new Northampton Township Senior Center will be dedicated on Sunday September 12th as part of the Northampton Day celebrations. Because of restrictions placed on us by the center we have decided to not have our meetings there in the future. Our September meeting will be at our past location, in the community room, at the library. Library construction, which will start in late September, will mean relocating our November dinner meeting to the Addisville Church in Richboro.
